TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

The gutter system supplied as part of the Synseal conservatory roof has been designed to be level.

Many modern day constructions, including house building, incorporate gutters that have been laid with no fall for aesthetic reasons. For other buildings, in particular office, commercial or industrial, gutters are laid to a level as it is not practical nor possible to achieve a recognised fall because of the longer lengths of roof encountered.

The relevant British Standard that permits this practise is BS 6367: 1983 (British Standard Code of Practises for Drainage of Roofs and Paved Areas – Formerly CP 308). The Hunter Regency system used with the Synseal roof has been designed in accordance with this document. The British Standard clearly states that gutters may be laid level if the capacity or cross sectional area is sufficient for the volume of water encountered with relation to the downpipe(s) position.
